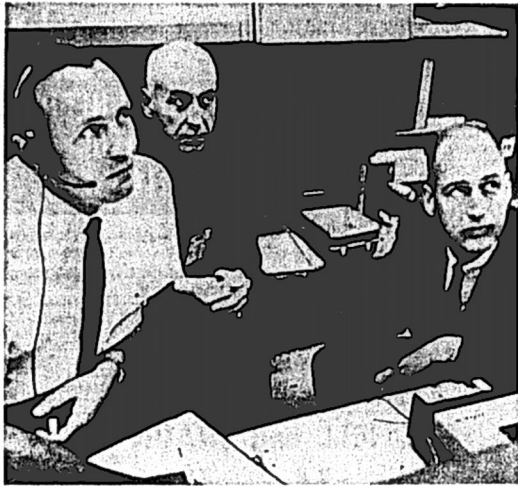

### 5 Teens In Cape Car

CAPE ELIZABETH—A Cape Elizabeth youth was killed and four other teenagers were injured, none seriously, in a one-car crash on Spruick Road early Sunday morning.

Louis J. Tetreau Jr., 18, of 9 Farm Hill Road was pronounced dead at the Maine Medical Center, Medical Examiner Wilbur P. Leshington said Tetreau died of a fractured skull.

Police Chief Herbert Mariner said Tetreau was the driver of the car. He said the other passengers told him the car appeared to have gone out of control just before the accident.

TETREAU was born in Portland Feb. 19, 1947, son of Louis J. and Mary J. Conley Tetreau Sr. He had summer employment in the line department of the Central Maine Power Co. and was to enter the Air Force in Texas Sept. 20.

Besides his parents, he leaves three sisters, Joan Marie, Kathryn A. and Denise Tetreau; his grandmothers, Mrs. Julia Conley, Portland, and Mrs. Cordelia Tetreau, Rochester, N.H.; an uncle, an aunt and several cousins.

Prayers will be said at 8:45 a.m. Wednesday at 172 State St., followed by a solemn Requiem Mass in Holy Cross Church, South Portland, at 9 a.m. Interment will be in Calvary Cemetery.

Mariner said the car rolled over three or four times. None of the five occupants was thrown from the car.

Mariner said the five were headed toward Wells when the accident occurred. He said some of them worked at the summer resort.

The victim was graduated last June from Cape Elizabeth High School where he was active in soccer, track, basketball, bowling, chess and the Varsity Club.

He was a communicant of Holy Cross Church, South Portland, and was a graduate of its Confraternity of Christian Doctrine studies. He was a member of Cheverus Council, Knights of Columbus.

## Rich Vein Of Gold Hit At Pembroke

MONTREAL — The "most spectacular drill hole findings ever produced on the East Coast of the United States or Canada," have been uncovered at Pembroke, Maine, Charles D. Robbins Jr., president, Dolan Mines Ltd., announced Sunday.

Checked and rechecked by assays, a single hole in the so-called Barrett zone of an area Dolan has been drilling this summer showed over a 9.7-foot-wide strip, 2.44 per cent copper, 1.83 ounces of gold per ton and 1.14 ounces of silver a ton.

MINING COSTS are estimated at \$10 to \$15 a ton. The copper at that per cent is commercially valuable. Gold is selling at about \$35 an ounce and silver is at its highest price in years.

As a comparison, Robbins said he was earlier quite excited when gold was found in another drill hole at the Pembroke site which ran only 1.06 ounces per ton.

In a wider extension on the same drill hole, Dolan has found 2.15 ounces of gold per ton in a 17.3-foot-wide strip, including the 9.7 foot strip already mentioned.

"You find two ounces of gold in a ton in strips one to four feet wide," Robbins said, "finding it in a 17-foot wide strip is like the gold mine of New Mexico, Utah or Arizona."

**THE HOLE IN QUESTION** is called 8-29. In the 17.3 feet down, these values were found: 1.8 per cent copper, 2.15 ounces of gold per ton and 1.14 ounces of silver a ton.

Drill holes are used to find out what an area of mineralization contains. The drill brings up cores showing the composition of the minerals or what ever is in the hole. Those cores, especially the ones which appear to have minerals in them, are then sent to laboratories for assay to find out the percentage of minerals involved.

Dolan has been having his assays on the Pembroke work done by Blairs Laboratories at the great mining development in Balmist, New Brunswick.

Robbins said the rich hole was on the western edge of the mineralization in the Barrett zone and has opened up a door for more work farther west. Hole 8-41 is now being drilled 100 feet west of 8-29.

Hole 8-39 is 539 feet west of hole 8-34 where ore has been found as far east as the Barrett drilling runs. Fourteen holes have been drilled between 8-29 and 8-32.

## Guardsmen Protect Demonstrators

### Volpe, City 'Relieved And Gratified'

## Springfield Protest March Peaceful

SPRINGFIELD, Mass. (AP) — An estimated 1,000 persons marched singing and clapping through streets lined by National Guardsmen Sunday in a civil rights protest staged by authorities for its orderlies.

After the marchers dispersed without incident, Gov. John A. Volpe issued a statement saying he was "relieved and gratified."

The participants walked three abreast and completed a two-mile trek to City Hall in about 30 minutes.

Then, after speeches protesting alleged police brutality in arrests of Negroes, about half the marchers turned around and walked back to the school playground where they began.

"I thought the CORE (Congress of Racial Equality) people did a good job," said Maj. Gen. Joseph M. Ambrose, state adjutant general. Mayor Charles V. Ryan Jr. termed the day "a satisfactory."

Volpe said a force of National Guard troops would remain on alert as Westfield Armory in case they were needed later in the night.

Volpe said he thought Thursday's conference with the march organizers "did much to avert trouble." He said the way of future progress is to "plan and act around the conference table."

When the march started there were about 700 in the ranks, but Capt. James McCarthy of the Springfield police said the marchers numbered about 1,000 by the time they reached Court Square.

The two-hour rally protesting alleged police brutality in recent arrests of Negroes was completed without incident.

At City Hall, some 2,000 whites looked on as a series of talks circulated through the marchers.

But there wasn't a hint of trouble about the march route and the early sounds were the singing of freedom songs and the clapping of hands in time to the music.

Oscar Bright, Springfield chairman of the Congress of Racial Equality, described the march and rally as a "tremendous success."

## Viet Platoon Hit Hard By Cong

SAIGON, South Viet Nam (AP) — The Viet Cong struck a dozen miles from Saigon on Sunday, pounding on a South Vietnamese platoon and inflicting heavy casualties. But government irregulars in another action only six miles out routed a guerrilla unit.

U.S. Army airborne troops completed a road-clearing operation in the central highlands but made no contact with Viet Cong forces. On Van Thang peninsula, U.S. Marines killed three more Viet Cong, apparently stragglers from the three-day battle last week that headed off a Communist attack on the Marine air base at Chu Lai. Marine officials said they had confirmed by body count 500 enemy dead in that battle.

In another action Sunday, a Marine patrol killed three guerrillas four miles south of the strategic Da Nang air base. A spokesman said the Viet Cong were about to lay down a mortar barrage. There were no government casualties, he said.

U.S. air action continued against North Viet Nam with the bombing of a hydroelectric dam and other strategic points. All planes were reported to have returned safely.

The action outside Saigon involved about two companies of Viet Cong, perhaps 200 men, who ambushed a government platoon. A U.S. military spokesman said government casualties were high but he gave no numbers. Viet Cong losses, if any, were not known.

Closer to Saigon, a popular force, or civilian militia, unit ambushed an unknown number of Viet Cong on Saturday night, killing one of the guerrillas and Continued on Page 18; 1st Col.
