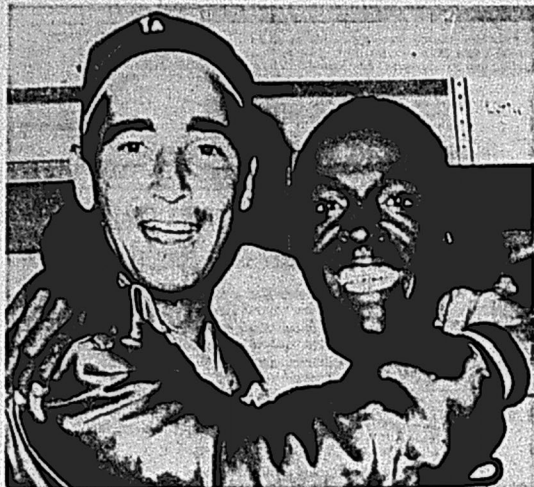


Koufax Hurls L.A. Dodgers To World Title

MINNEAPOLIS—ST. PAUL (UPI)—The Los Angeles Dodgers won the World Series for the third time in six years Thursday by beating the Minnesota Twins, 2-0, on Sandy Koufax' three-hit pitching.

Koufax, the 29-year-old left-handed premier pitcher in baseball who didn't even know for sure he'd start the big seventh game finale before he came out to the park, humbled the Twins for the second time in the series. But he might not have done it without the help of two old geezers—Lou Johnson and Jim Gilliam.

Johnson, a 31-year-old refugee from baseball's broken-down bus and warmed over assault circuit, provided the winning margin with his second homer of the series in the fourth inning. The 37-year-old Gilliam, who began the season as a coach and headhunter, Bob Allison, Koufax' personal pitcher throughout the Series, also struck out to end the game.

The exhilarated Dodgers, who won the Series after the Twins had runners on first and second with one out in the fifth. Eddie Velazquez followed with several more hits, including the third base line and the ball had two bases written all over it. But Gilliam somehow backhanded it, forcing back, wards and got up in time to slip on third for a forecourt.

Resolution OK'd Creating Water Resources Panel

WASHINGTON—The newly organized Federal Water Resources Council Thursday unanimously approved a resolution to create a New England River Basins Commission to plan water resources development for the drought-stricken area.

It also would prepare and periodically update a comprehensive and coordinated plan for water resource development in the area.

The commission would serve as the principal agency for coordinating federal, state, interstate, local and non-governmental plans for development of water and related resources of the region.

The commission also would recommend long-range priorities for investigating, planning and constructing projects to foster and undertake studies of water and related land resource problems needed to prepare a comprehensive regional plan.

Council approval of the resolution creating the commission came on the request of the New England Governors Conference.

The state's chief executives had urged the action at a meeting in Springfield, Mass., Sept. 15. The governors' position was transmitted to the council by Gov. John H. Reed, conference chairman.

In asking council approval of the resolution, the governors said, "Current drought conditions make it imperative that sound water resources planning and programming be intensified and accelerated without delay in the New England region."

THE COMMISSION would serve areas in New England and part of New York State within the drainage basin of the Housatonic River.

Excluded from commission authority would be the parts of Vermont and Massachusetts in the drainage area of the Hudson River and the part of Vermont in the drainage area of Lake Champlain.

Membership on the commission would include representatives of the affected states, appointed by their governors, representatives of federal agencies affected, representatives of affected interstate agencies and, when appropriate, representatives of interested bodies created by treaties ratified by the Senate.

The commission would be financed by the federal government and appropriation of funds to carry out the Water Resources Act. The states have agreed to contribute funds for the rest of the current fiscal year totaling \$30,000.

The act, signed by the President July 22, created the Federal Water Resources Council. It consists of the Secretaries of Interior, Agriculture, the Army and Health, Education and Welfare and the chairman of the Federal Power Commission.

The council advises the President on national water policy, maintains a continuing study of national water needs, coordinates activities of federal water resource agencies and reviews the relationship of regional or river basin plans to national requirements.

Conferees Put Off Until Today Verdict On Dickey Dam Project

WASHINGTON (UPI)—Two teams of hard-nosed Congressional bargainers adjourned a two-hour negotiating session early Thursday evening without announcing any decisions on the fate of a proposed \$227 million Dickey-Lincoln School power project on the upper St. John River in Maine.

Authorization of a project is the vital first hurdle which must be cleared before Congress can appropriate money to start planning and construction.
